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**As a parent\*, there are lots of questions you will have when helping your son or daughter to choose a university, such as: What happens in the application process? What support is offered to students? What is the situation regarding student finance? What are the career options available? And, most importantly, is the choice they make going to be right for them?**

**This Guide will help you support your son or daughter through this process by summarising the key decisions that they will need to make, as well as by providing information about studying at Newcastle.**

If you would like to find out more about the issues surrounding university education, each year Newcastle University organises a **Parent and Carer Information Event**. This event is for parents of pupils who are currently studying in Year 11 or Year 12 (first-year college) but is open to any parent who has an interest in finding out more.

The programme offers a range of informal sessions, giving you the opportunity to have your questions answered. The sessions look at the application process, student support, finance, student life and supporting your son or daughter through their university course. The information is aimed at anyone who fulfils a parenting role for a young person in the UK who is considering a university education.*

# Choosing the Right Course and University

**With over 50,000 courses to choose from at over 300 institutions across the UK, choosing the right course and university can seem daunting.**

It is important that your son or daughter gathers as much information as possible about the universities that interest them. They need to find out about the quality of teaching and facilities, what support services are available and the opportunities on offer to develop their personal skills, make friends and have fun.

As a starting point, they will need to consider:

- **the subject(s) they want to study** – which universities offer their subject and does the course include topics suited to their interests, abilities, and any career paths they are considering?
- **the type of teaching and assessment they prefer**
- **entry requirements**
- **the kind of university they want to attend** – for example; campus or city based, traditional or modern

Other factors affecting their choice of university might be distance from home, reputation, geographical location, cost of living, and student facilities. Having the right 'feel' can also make a big difference, so it's important to visit as many institutions as possible to compare environments. This can be done any time before or after the UCAS application deadline, as long as your son or daughter has had the chance to visit *before* they make their final firm and insurance choices.

# The Application Process 2011 Entry: A Step-by-Step Guide

To help you understand and support each stage of the application process, we have produced a schedule of what your son or daughter will be expected to do from the Spring term of Year 12 (first-year college).

**March 2010** Start researching options in higher education with careers tutors at school or college. If possible, attend a higher education convention to gather more information (these take place throughout the UK from March onwards).

**April – October 2010** Narrow down the choices of courses and institutions. Attend Visit Days at the shortlisted institutions to help make the right decision.

**Summer Holidays 2010** Use this time to finalise choices and think about the information to be included in the UCAS (Universities and Colleges Admission Service) application. UCAS is the clearing house for all full-time undergraduate degree programmes at British universities and colleges. Applicants submit their application via the UCAS website and this is then forwarded to the relevant universities for consideration.

**September 2010** Start to complete the UCAS application, listing up to five course choices (a maximum of four for medicine, dentistry or veterinary courses) and ensure that it is submitted to UCAS by the correct deadline. UCAS will then send the application to each chosen university for consideration. Often schools/colleges set an earlier deadline to allow time to complete references.

## UCAS Application Deadlines:

Most courses: 15 January 2011.  
Oxford, Cambridge, and courses in Medicine, Dentistry and Veterinary Science:  
15 October 2010.

*Please note: UCAS dates and deadlines are correct at the time of going to press (May 2010) but are subject to final confirmation by UCAS.*

**October 2009 – March 2011** Official decisions from universities will be sent to you through the UCAS online Track system. Most universities will probably send a separate invitation to an interview or a subject-specific open day.

## Types of Responses:

**Unconditional offer:** A place has been offered with no conditions.

**Conditional offer:** A place has been offered provided that certain conditions are met (eg certain grades).

**Unsuccessful application:** The institution has decided that it is unable to offer a place.



**Final Choices:**

After decisions from all universities are received, it is time to make a firm choice and an insurance choice. If an offer is not made by any of the five choices, UCAS Extra provides the opportunity to make further course choices (one at a time) through UCAS.

**Firm choice:** This should be the offer that the student would most like to accept.

**Insurance choice:** This may be used as a back-up to a firm choice. The conditions of offers accepted as insurance are usually easier to meet than those of offers accepted firmly. If an applicant is not accepted onto the firm choice course but meets the conditions of the insurance choice, the insurance choice course will accept the applicant.

All applicants should fill in the relevant forms, even if they don't think they are eligible for help.



**Summer 2011** Results for a range of qualifications are issued at different times throughout the summer, but one big date to note will be in August 2011, when A level results are expected to come out. If the conditions of the firm choice offer are met – congratulations! UCAS will be in touch to confirm a place. If your son or daughter does not quite meet the firm choice offer conditions, they may still get accepted, and UCAS will inform them of this. If they are not accepted onto the firm choice course but meet the offer conditions of the insurance choice course, a place on this course will be confirmed by UCAS.

The UCAS Clearing Service can provide additional options for applicants who do not gain a place at either their firm or insurance choice course. During the Clearing period, information about course vacancies at Newcastle can be obtained from our website or by calling the Newcastle University Clearing Helpline, which will be advertised on our website. Please note, demand for Clearing places is very high, so we advise you to do this as soon as possible.

# Campus Life

## **The Students' Union**

Newcastle was rated the joint best university for social life in the 2009 *Times Higher Education Supplement* survey of student experience. The four-storey Students' Union Building is the main social destination for students at the University. It is *the* place to take a break, join in activities and meet new people. Run by six full-time and 19 part-time officers who are elected each year, the Union organises a regular programme of entertainment including quiz nights, comedy events and popular club nights.

Our diverse student community provides plenty of opportunities to get involved in extra-curricular activities. The Students' Union supports over 140 societies, 57 sport clubs, many volunteering initiatives, and lots of other activities that appeal to our students.

The Union offers fantastic opportunities for students looking to gain media experience, with the award-winning student newspaper, *The Courier* and a student radio station, NSR. Our students also contribute to activities and projects in the local community, and the Union is involved in campaigns throughout the year, including Health Awareness, and Raising and Giving (RAG).

## Student Support

We do everything we can to make the transition to university life as easy as possible. Our integrated support services provide specialist assistance to students on a wide range of issues, from finance to accommodation and emotional wellbeing.

Our tutorial system ensures that students progress through their studies in a supportive environment. From the start of their course, students are assigned a personal tutor who monitors their progress and meets to discuss any academic or personal concerns they may have.

The Student Advice Centre, based in the Students' Union, provides independent professional support on issues such as finance, academic problems and housing.

Our Student Wellbeing team of professionally qualified counsellors and advisers offers further support for students with concerns about life at university, family difficulties or emotional problems. The Student Wellbeing Service adheres to a confidentiality policy, and our practitioners work to a strict code of ethical practice.

# Student Accommodation

**If your son or daughter is moving away from home it's important they find the right place to live, and at Newcastle we work hard to meet the accommodation needs and preferences of our students.**

## Accommodation Guarantee

During the first year of study, our students are guaranteed a place in University accommodation, provided they:

- are a first-year undergraduate coming alone to the University for the full academic year
- live in an area from which it would be unreasonable to commute to the University by public transport (determined by distance and travel time)
- have accepted our offer of a place on a course at the University as their firm choice
- complete and submit the online Accommodation Application Form by 30 June of the year they are due to begin their course

If your son or daughter is not covered by the guarantee, they are still welcome to apply for a place in University accommodation. If they live within reasonable commuting distance of the University, they should apply in the usual way. If we are unable to offer them a room at the start of term, we may be able to arrange temporary accommodation or they may be asked to live at home until a room becomes available. Most students are usually accommodated within the first term.

## Types of University Accommodation

We have a variety of affordable accommodation, ranging from catered accommodation to self-catered flats. All University accommodation is within a three-mile radius of the campus and around half is within a 10-minute walk. In all University single-student accommodation, heating and lighting costs, student contents insurance and Internet charges are included in the rent. All University student rooms have network connections for personal computers or laptops. We also have a number of rooms for students with special requirements, such as mobility support. ## A Safe Place to Live

Our catered accommodation has wardens on hand to provide welfare support, and the self-catered accommodation benefits from a 24-hour security team which provides support in case of emergencies. Many sites also have entry-phone systems and CCTV.

## Applying for Accommodation

Candidates can apply for accommodation as soon as they receive an offer from the University via the online form on the Accommodation Service website.

The Accommodation Application Form must then be submitted online by 30 June 2011 if they are due to start in September 2011.

Late, insurance or Clearing applicants will be advised about the accommodation options open to them. If we are unable to place them in University accommodation for the start of term, they will be given details of temporary housing until a room becomes available. Most students are accommodated within the first few weeks of term.

## Private Accommodation

If your son or daughter is not eligible for University accommodation or would prefer to live in private-rented accommodation, the Accommodation Service can offer advice and assistance on finding private accommodation. Newcastle has a wide range to choose from and details of flats, houses and lodgings can be found on the Accommodation Service website: [www.ncl.ac.uk/accommodation/private](http://www.ncl.ac.uk/accommodation/private)

After a year in University accommodation, most students choose to move into private accommodation with friends. The Accommodation Service provides advice on how to find private accommodation. They can also check tenancy agreements and liaise with landlords on behalf of students.



# Money

**Finance is a big concern for the parents of anyone going into higher education. Here is an overview of the costs involved and the financial support that your son or daughter may be entitled to.**

## Tuition Fees

We will be charging a tuition fee of **£3,290** per year for all eligible full-time courses for 2010 entry. The tuition fee for 2011 entry will be slightly higher than this.\* The tuition fee does not have to be paid upfront. Instead, students can choose to defer making repayments until after they graduate and are earning over £15,000 per year by taking out a 'fee' loan.

## Student Loans

Alongside fee loans, student loans to support living costs such as accommodation, food and travel are also available for each year of a student's course.

## Government Grants

Depending on your household income, your son or daughter may be eligible for a grant of up to **£2,906** per year (2010 entry)\* in government financial support, which does not have to be paid back.

## Newcastle University Bursaries

We aim to admit the brightest and best students, regardless of background, and provide additional financial support in the form of a means-tested Newcastle University Undergraduate Bursary – worth up to **£1,500** per year for eligible students – which does not have to be paid back.

Students who are eligible for a Newcastle University Undergraduate Bursary based on financial grounds may also be eligible for a further Newcastle University Achievement Bursary worth up to **£750** per year if they achieve high entry grades.

## Newcastle Excellence Scholarship Scheme

We also offer a range of scholarships and other awards to recognise and reward outstanding achievement and ability. These Scholarships are awarded solely on academic achievement, do not have to be repaid, and can be worth up to **£2,400** each.

## Additional Help

This is available for specific categories of students, such as disabled students and students with children.

## Cost of Living

Student loans are available to support living costs for each year of your son's or daughter's course, and it is useful to research living costs in the locations they are considering. The cost of living in Newcastle is generally lower than many other parts of the UK and there are many student discounts to be found in the restaurants, bars and shops. The Careers Service can also help students looking for a suitable part-time job. Most student accommodation is a walk or short bus/Metro ride from the University campus, which means transport costs are kept to a minimum.

This friendly, supportive welcome ensures that our students can relax and settle in before teaching starts, and look forward to the year ahead.
