And mingle with the wind.



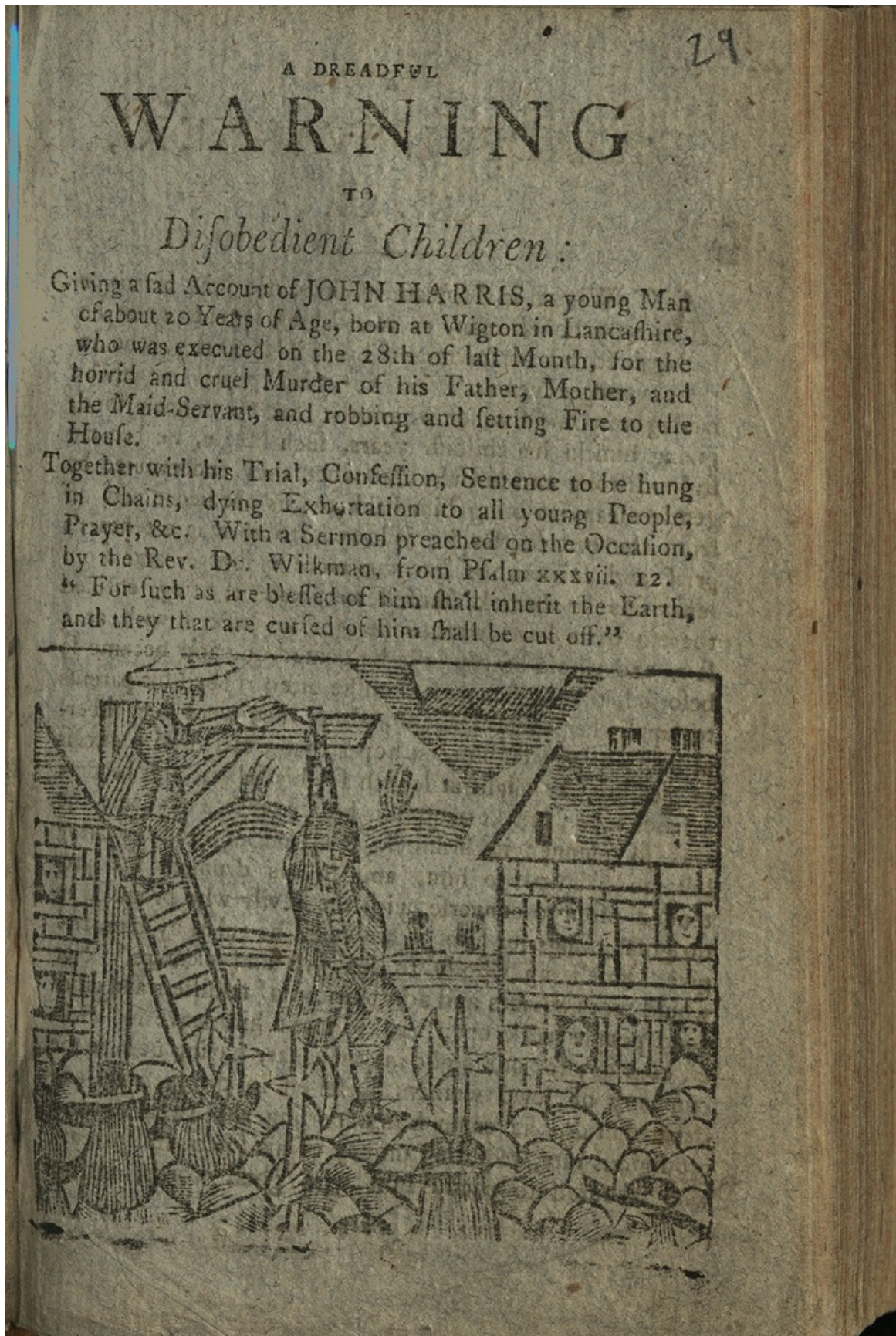
But oh! his soul—that awful word—
