Online Assignment Submission Principles

Background

- 1. In October 2014 ULTSEC considered the UK Quality Code as related to assessment. As part of the issues considered UTLSEC decided that all appropriate assessments should be submitted through Turnitin.
- 2. In July 2020, the University changes VLE from Blackboard to Canvas. Turnitin assignments are integrated into Canvas, as well as Canvas having its own submission tool, so that academic units have a choice of which online submission tool they wish to use.

Principles for using Online Assignment Submission

- 3. Turnitin similarity checks are available for both Canvas and Turnitin online assignment submission.
- Individual academic units should determine what assessments to put through Canvas or Turnitin Assignments using the following principles: Students' assessed work should be put through a Turnitin similarity check (either Canvas or Turnitin assignment) where:
 - a) the assessment contains more than 250 words (i.e. a side of A4) and
 - b) the assessment counts for more than 10% of the module
- 5. or where
 - c) the assessment is designed to help students become proficient in academic writing or to check their proficiency in academic writing.
- 6. Students should not be permitted to see their similarity report when using multiple draft submission. Exceptions to this requirement should only happen where the assessment has a specific developmental purpose, for example the first piece of work submitted to a programme or as part of a formative process of developing high quality academic writing.
- 7. It is recommended that
 - a) Schools communicate clearly to students when their work will be put through Turnitin similarity checker, for example via the Module Handbook or equivalent information.
 - b) There is a clearly identified colleague in the academic unit (usually the DoE) who has the authority to approve assessments which are exempt from the principles.
- 8. All student work should be added to the Turnitin repository unless
 - a) It is commercially sensitive (as some Masters' theses are)
 - b) Contains personal data such as patient details or survey respondent details which could allow the individual to be identified
 - c) It forms part of a later piece of work which will be submitted through a Turnitin similarity check e.g. Progress reports for PGR students
- 9. In these cases the assessment should be set up to compare students' work to the Turnitin repository but not to add the work to the repository.
- 10. The application of the principles will be monitored as part of the LTR process.
