Aims

To allow students to demonstrate their potential to succeed in specified degree programmes by showing a grasp of entry-level subject-specific knowledge, understanding, cognitive and subject-specific skills.

Learning Outcomes

A good knowledge and understanding of ...

- What it is like to be a student in the Combined Honours Centre at Newcastle University
- Our Partners week focuses on personal development and reflection, understanding of the options available to you and preparation for your forthcoming degree (with us)
- The academic literacies required for Higher Education and learn about the schemes and societies available to you through Combined Honours to support you through your chosen degree pathway.
- What it is like to study with us, within a learning environment that simulates an authentic university experience and based on readings and other resources that echo this.
- Our week looks at student experience, student engagement, student voice and the expectations of higher education

- The importance of collaboration and relationship with peers and understanding how and where your interests may overlap.

• Issues of identity and representation when in higher education; our week will offer opportunities to think about how students gain a sense of belonging at university and what to expect from the transition to higher education.

The ability to apply this knowledge and critical understanding to...

- The formative assessment for Combined Honours is a reflective piece of working asking students to:
 - Identify one key lesson or experience you are taking away from our Combined Honours input
 - Explain how you have arrived at that point in your understanding
 - Comment on how this experience or lesson will influence your decision making about university and why that is?

Competence in...

- Self-reflection and evaluative discussion, as there will be opportunities for both oral and written academic reflection.
- Navigating and accessing the support networks, opportunities and degree pathways available in Combined Honours at Newcastle.
- Understanding personal motivation, self-confidence and resilience; this understanding is needed to frame decisions and thoughts related to future educational pathways.
- The week will also offer students a chance to become better informed and more confident about their degree choice, and so having gained competencies in judgement and decision making and interpersonal effectiveness.

Summer School Syllabus

Utilising the experience and learning offered this week in order to make an informed decision about whether Combined Honours is the most suitable programme for you in your transition to Higher Education. The programme also seeks to offer opportunities to build networks and a sense of cohort identity with other widening participation students likely to be starting the programme together in September. Pre entry peer support and early familiarisation with university systems and procedures is proven to be beneficial to widening participation students as this increases a sense of emotional security and confidence in the first semester.
