- There are a huge number of journals and magazines dedicated to art in the UK – Art Monthly is a good place to start. Museum & Society, Curator Magazine, On Curating, bits of Frieze, and Art Newspaper (and many, many more) are all free and open access. Keep trying until you find one you like!
- If you are on Twitter – join in with #MuseumHour. Follow venues and (potential) colleagues you like, as well as academics and groups with relevant interests (e.g. you might want to look up @NEEACN). If you're not on twitter (and don't want to join) find and follow all the local galleries and museums on other social media, or add your email to venue's mailing lists - they'll send you news about exhibition openings and special events.
- Most importantly, if possible, visit local galleries, festivals, libraries, public artworks everything!
